

## MORE THAN A RULE BOOK: Identity and the Australian Constitution

The Australian Constitution is often described in notably prosaic terms as a pragmatic set of rules for governing the country or even as a 'rule book'. These portrayals emphasise the functional nature of the Constitution and seek to distinguish it from other constitutions that have a more prominent role in the political culture of their polity. The purpose of this lecture is to dispel this picture. It will argue that these conventional accounts of the Australian Constitution underestimate its complexity and its significance. It will identify a distinctively Australian set of constitutional ideas, practices, and values that (for good or ill) animate our Constitution and in turn influence our political culture.
